I am happy to

and welcome.

I have been  
nudging myself to come out  
to the wilds of Mare Island  
to draft my annual Flyway  
Festival welcome letter.  
Today, I hope to share the  
happening of the year with  
you and wish you a  
marvelous holiday and  
wintering migration season.

Here at the Mare Island San  
Pablo Bay Trail in our  
magical little corner, I can  
focus on our wilderness  
(wild near us) and on you,  
my wildlands community  
from whom I receive my  
inspiration and who I  
cherish, so.

In the past, I have stayed  
the night at our Mare Island  
Shoreline Heritage  
Preserve. Still in my  
sleeping bag with a hot cup  
of coffee, As I wrote, I've  
observed the beauty of the  
morning light in the woods  
and on the vast wildlands.

My first experience of birds on Mare Island was while preparing for the first Flyway Festival, we found dead barn owls in Building 505. They are always in my heart, since. Black phoebes are, too. We found them inside, but alive.

I remember one evening  
after we were dismissed  
from the management of  
our beloved Mare Island  
Shoreline Heritage  
Preserve, my letter writing  
was weighing on me with  
some urgency. Yet, the  
challenge of finding a sit  
spot to quietly reflect, was  
thwarting me. Finally, I  
drove over to the majestic  
and magnificent blue gum  
eucalyptus grove that lines  
the roadway to the  
Preserve. There, sitting in a  
camp chair with my laptop,  
and my legs wrapped in a  
hopefully mosquito-proof  
blanket and Nitro at my  
side, I drew inspiration from  
the Napa River/Mare Island  
Strait with its lights and  
boats, aglow in the late  
evening light. Perched on  
the low bluff amongst the  
trees, I crafted my message  
to you, that year.

Like today, more than once  
in the last few years, I have  
found a serene spot near  
the San Pablo Bay Trail  
where I settle in for my  
afternoon letter writing  
session, listening to  
flocks of birds, flitting  
and calling in the  
fennel and nearby  
trees. I've watched a  
northern harrier swoop  
and swoosh over the  
wetlands and a white-  
tailed kite hover over its'  
prey and even videoed it,  
till it disappears behind the  
palm trees.

Today is somewhat bleak,  
yet, when I glance toward  
the mountains, bright white  
clouds lounge against the  
darker clouds seeming to  
give them a place to rest in  
the sky above and the  
white-tailed kite hovering  
on the hunt, catches my  
eye, again.

A red floating crane towers  
over the "blue bridge" in the  
distance. At long last, the  
traditional bright blue paint  
is beginning to be renewed.

The vistas, even on a quite  
dreary day, are captivating  
to me. In the far view,  
shrouded in dense misty  
clouds, is the southern  
terminus of the Mayacamas  
Range in the Carneros in  
Sonoma County, where  
around the corner and 60  
miles away, is my *Camp  
Myrna* at 2500-2700 ft on  
the southeast flank of Cobb  
Mountain in Lake County.

The Napa River Bridge  
arches high above the  
landscape to the northeast,

perched as if in a yoga  
pose, over the Napa River  
Valley and the Delta of San  
Pablo Bay. I see the outline  
of the Howell Mountain  
Range and it's southern  
terminus, also, this time  
serving as the eastern  
boundary of Vallejo. Maps  
identify this section of the  
Range as the Sulphur  
Mountains with its  
signature hill, Sulphur  
Mountain, most prominent.

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# Wilderness—wild near us...Go Wildly!

Over my shoulder, sits the historic headquarters of our Flyway Festival, founded 30 years ago inside the massive concrete walls of Building 505, the US Navy's radio transmission center for the Pacific before, during WWII and after, and later, a part of the Commissary complex.

Vast seasonal wetlands stretch in every direction, towards the narrow strip of developed Island along the Napa River/Mare Island Strait, to the western flank, a wild side of Mare Island, and to the San Pablo Bay Delta. Tonight, as ducks fly fast through the sky like small squadrons of fighter jets, and dozens of geese, coming at me, fly low, I am reminded that we are in the midst of the most abundant migration on the continent, along the Pacific Flyway. This is my Mare Island. And, the voices of hikers along the Trail, remind me that this is your Island, too. We share this common bond. This love of Mare Island.

I've been asked dozens of times over past years, why this place? What is so special about it? It is truly impossible to describe, convincingly, I admit. Yet, there is not one person of the most likely hundreds of thousands I have met in the past nearly 32 years of time spent here, or through our social media friendships, who will disagree with me.

We had secured \$2.4 mil in the Federal budget for a permanent environmental center and Refuge Headquarters, in FY Years 2000-2003 after 7 long years of my trips to Washington, D.C. But, then, there's this. Sadness.

They all exude this passion for the place. Each one of you, expresses your love for Mare Island, in all its' quirkiness if not strangeness, beauty, and well, ugliness, ordinariness and uniqueness that as an assemblage, a collection, simply can't be found anywhere else in the world.

It has been my privilege and honor to be asked by the US Navy, initially, to introduce you to this Island, in collaboration with the last Shipyard Commander, Captain John Cavender, in January of 1996. Now, I am equally thrilled to invite you to our 30th anniversary in February of 2026.

And, again this year, like last year, you'll likely notice a pretty confusing situation related to our Flyway Festival. After the weirdest of occurrences, where a City of Vallejo City Manager and his staff, along with a

State Senator and his staff and an ambitious local business owner, literally stole our Flyway Festival headquartered on Mare Island for 29 years, out from under us, we have, as they say in Great Britain, "moved house".

I kid you not! The city of Vallejo scooped our Flyway Festival. Really?! Yes, they took part of our name, the building we had used for a number of years(although as you will recall, we've held our Flyway Festival in about a dozen different buildings on Mare Island and even off-Island), and made insistent phone calls, urging our past presenters and exhibitors to participate in their bird watching event, they scheduled the weekend before ours. Oh my goodness. Talk about stealing someone else's labor of love. Yet, how many businesses and non-

profits are experiencing this, now? Especially online. It is what it is.

So, here's how we are keeping the spirit of our original San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival thriving. You are invited to join us for a continued first-person experience of not only Mare Island, but nearby and regional wetlands and woodlands, guided birdwatching, historic sites and even quirky places, like we always have.

Beginning in January 2025, I initiated **San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival Go Wildly Live Outdoors**. I Every weekend day that month, I personally hosted outings of all sorts, all over the San Pablo Bay region, as well as many on Mare Island, from early morning bird walks, to sunset hikes to historic Shipyard and Forest walks to a Pop Up Flyway Festival weekend at Moschetti Coffee Roasting in Vallejo. True to form, just mixing it up! And, it worked. Wildly.

The plan for our 30th anniversary is really an homage to our first Flyway Festival, held in Building 505, for 4 hours, with about a dozen agency and non-profit exhibitors and commercial vendors. The Navy was our co-host. They wanted to test whether there might be

public interest in the lands they had protected for wildlife and support for a plan to set aside some of the Island for public access.

The Military Police at the main gate issued 1,000 passes to our birding festival on the still closed, Navy base. And, we were off and running and have never looked back.

Even with setbacks, as wildlands and wilderness (wild near us), always seem to experience, due to development interests with more money than god, who influence local and even national governments to abandon permanent protections and public access, here we are, today. I thank you and I welcome you to join me on My Mare Island and throughout the nearby 10's of thousands of acres of former farmlands, restored and natural marshlands, tidal and seasonal wetlands, woodlands, bays, rivers and creeks, mountains all around and every imaginable natural habitat.

Mare Island, with a rather brief 142-year US Navy presence, has been an important part of this region to Native Peoples and wildlife, from before the first visits of Spanish and Russian explorers to the Bay, till now.

During our 30th Flyway Festival year, let's dive deeper into Mare Island, rooted in natural and cultural history, US Navy and national maritime history and geology.

Please join us February 13, 14 and 15, 2026 for our **San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival Go Wildly Live Outdoors**, when we will once again celebrate the migration of as many as 1 million shorebirds, a quarter million waterfowl, ducks and geese, and likely tens of thousands of raptors, hawks and millions of songbirds, to and through San Francisco Bay.

Isn't it so magical that we live nearby to these gatherings on the waters and in the sky at our national wildlife refuges, state wildlife areas and local wildlands parks?!

Just this afternoon, as I wrote, my Merlin App was clocking these birds. Some might be regulars. Some

are very special. Black Phoebe, Savannah Sparrow, House Finch, American Crow, White-tailed Kite, American Pipit, Golden-crowned Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, Song Sparrow, Short-eared Owl,

Mallard, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Lincoln's Sparrow, Western Bluebird, Lesser Goldfinch, Hermit Thrush, Canada Goose, ring-necked pheasant and Common Yellowthroat. Whew!! Amazing.

This 30th annual Flyway Festival will be a version of the "original" Flyway Festival you have loved for almost three decades. As the weeks unfold, you will learn of plans for this year's **San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival Go Wildly Live Outdoors**.

What do you think? Are you ready for our Pop Up Saturday and Sunday at Moschetti Coffee in Vallejo and our free outings full of surprises? To be clear, we'll host an exhibitor, vendor and presenter gathering in Vallejo, NOT at any of our traditional headquarters on Mare Island. Rest assured, there will be plenty of guided bird watching and hiking tours ON Mare Island, and around the "north shore" of San Francisco Bay.

We will Live air on our Facebook Group Page, "2023 Hybrid/Virtual San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival" and Mare Island Shoreline Heritage Preserve Page.

Let's just call this year's Flyway Festival, "**Myrna's San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival Go Wildly Live Outdoors**".
